

Union Energy Program Gives Discounts to Union Families

If you had the choice, would you give \$100 to a Northeast Utilities executive, or put the money in your own pocket?

That's the choice you get by joining the Union Energy Alliance's residential power program. The UEA is endorsed by the CT AFL-CIO, and was designed to save working families money on electric bills. That's especially important in Connecticut, where we have some of the highest electric rates in the country.

The UEA offers a rate of 7.89 cents per kilowatt hour. That's the lowest 6-month fixed rate for electricity available in the state and it's only available until March 1st. Other companies may have cheaper "introductory rates," but those climb high after three months. UEA commits to keeping their rates low as a basic business model.

Most important – by signing up with the UEA, you are helping two great organizations that help working families. The United Labor Agency helps working families in time of crisis. GrowJobsCT advocates for manufacturing jobs in our state. Both organizations receive a portion of the proceeds from the Union Energy Alliance program.

Either way, have your electric bill with you when deciding to enroll. Perigee Energy is the supplier who offers special rates to union families. The UEA rates Perigee charges are lower than the rates Perigee charges all their other customers.

The UEA does not have a fee to join or any penalty for early withdrawal. Any problem with your electric lines or outages are repaired, as always, by the utility company. You receive only one bill, from the utility, with the program generation charge visible, but not separate.
